LIONS NSW-ACT PUBLIC HEALTH CARE FOUNDATION AND LOCAL LIONS CLUB JOIN FORCES TO ASSIST CHILDREN'S CANCER RESEARCH UNIT

The Lions Club of West Pennant Hills Cherrybrook and the Lions NSW-ACT Public Health Foundation have joined forces to respond to an urgent request by the Westmead Children's Cancer Research Unit to replace their Orbital Shaker Incubators. Their old machines simply wore out and without the replacements important cancer research projects would have to be postponed.

The new Orbital Incubators are used by researchers to isolate and grow specific genes thought to be involved in causing cancer. The machines grow different genes in bacterial cells, which carry the unique genes that are placed in them. Bacteria are grown in the incubators and when researchers have a full container they isolate the gene of interest from the bacteria. This, essentially, allows the researchers to make unlimited quantities of specific genes and to study how they are expressed in cancers.

The Club's President, Mr. Alan Penney, presented a cheque for \$12,590 to the Research Unit's Head, Associate Professor Jennifer Bryne. He said that the Lions Club continues to be a major donor to the Cancer Unit's work, having donated over \$63,000 in recent years to assist the survival rate of young patients. President Alan added that, as the equipment did not qualify for government funding, the Westmead Research Unit is reliant on community volunteer organisations like Lions International to provide vital equipment for ongoing research. He urged other community groups to follow his Club's example and help support Children's cancer research.

Associate Professor, Dr. Jennifer Byrne, on behalf of the Unit, thanked the Lions Club and the Lions NSW-ACT Public Health Foundation for their hard work in raising the funds from the community. She said that the unit's scientific team very much appreciated the donation to assist in furthering their work and improving patient treatment outcomes.

In 1984 at the annual Lions convention in NSW, Professor Frank Billson spoke of the urgent need for an eye institute to be associated with Sydney Eye Hospital. Following further meetings with representatives of NSW Lions Clubs, the Lions Save Sight Foundation and Lions Clubs of NSW agreed to provide seed funding for an Institute to be established.

In partnership with the University of Sydney, the Save Sight and Eye Health Institute was established on 4th June 1986. Professor Frank Billson AO, Head of the Department of Clinical Ophthalmology, Sydney University was appointed Director of the Institute. With this Institute we offered the community, the government and the university, the opportunity to share in a joint mission - "to prevent blindness".

The Institute exists to support and extend the work of the University's Dept of Clinical Ophthalmology.

Donation & Transplant Data

With thanks to our generous donor families, the success of organ culture corneal storage (see over page) and a replenished coordination workforce, the Lions NSW Eye Bank has at the end of October surpassed the previous highest annual donation and transplantation rates.

To the end of October the eye bank has facilitated the assessment and retrieval from 425 eye donors and 628 transplants.


The previous highest donor numbers were 381 (2011) and 386 (2002). The previous highest transplant numbers were 519 (2006) and 585 (2011).

Final data for 2012 will be reported to the National Organ and Tissue Authority and the Eye Bank Association of Australia and New Zealand.






Outcome of First 12 Months of New Corneal Storage Method

As reported in the July version of this newsletter, the Lions NSW Eye Bank introduced a new storage method for corneas in Sept 2011 that has provide an opportunity for more people to become eye donors. This new method compliments the existing storage method proving a greater range of options for people requiring transplantation of eye tissue.

Organ Culture has significantly influenced the donation and transplant rates. An expected increase in donor rates of 20-25% has been surpassed with a 43% increase compared to the same time period the 2010-2011 and a 47% increase in the corneal transplantation rate over the same period.

Collectively, these increases have resulted in a 41% decrease since Dec 2011 in the scheduled transplant wait list. Informal feedback from the surgeons using the organ culture corneas has been very positive. Ongoing monitoring of surgical outcomes and visual acuity will be done via the Australian Corneal Graft Registry.

Non-Medical Enucleators Course Held November 2012

Participating in the Non-Medical Enucleators course conducted by the Lions NSW Eye Bank is the first step for non-medical health employees to achieve acknowledgement and authorisation by NSW Director General of Health to conduct eye retrievals in accordance with the NSW 1983 Human Tissue Act.

The 2012 course was held on site at Sydney/Sydney Eye

Hospital on the 2nd November 2012. The 10 attendees were given presentations on the principles of Good Manufacturing Practice, eye anatomy and physiology, the surgical use of the retrieved eye tissue and a hands-on simulation of the actual retrieval procedure. Each of the participants must now conduct five witnessed retrievals before being considered for appointment.

NSW Plan for Organ and Tissue Donation & HTA Amendment

The NSW Minister for Health, the Hon. Ms Jillian Skinner MP launched the Government Plan for Increasing Organ Donation in NSW in August 2012. The plan outlines a range of strategies across five key outcome areas which include:

- Enabling people's intentions regarding organ and tissue donation to be known by their family or significant others and preferably documented and accessible;
- Addressing information gaps about organ and tissue donation, including addressing myths and misperceptions;
- Supporting clinicians to have conversations with donor families which enable fully informed decisions about proceeding with organ and tissue donation;

• Supporting living donor programs.

Strategies include transferring the existing donor intentions from the Roads & Maritime Service Register to the Australian Organ Donor Register and adding cardiovascular tissue to the list of tissue in the NSW Human Tissue Act that can be retrieved by competent non-medical health employees.
